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






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

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HISTORY OF THE SERIES

HISTORICAL OVERVIEW

Past & Present of the Swimming World Cup

World Aquatics launched the World Aquatics Championships in 1973 in Belgrade, establishing a flagship event that has since ranked alongside the Olympic Games as one of the sport's premier competitions. In the years that followed, the swimming community searched for opportunities to create an international competition in the fall season (for the Northern Hemisphere).

DURING THE 1970S AND THE 1980S, several federations staged successful meets such as the Arena Festival (Bonn, GER), the Speedo Meet (Amersfoort, NED, 50m), the Coca-Cola International (London's Crystal Palace, GBR, 50m), the NOK Schwimmfest (East Berlin, GDR, 50m) and the Meet de la Ville de Paris (FRA). In 1988, organisers from Toronto (CAN), Indianapolis (USA), Paris (FRA), East Berlin (GDR), Bonn (GER), Gothenburg (SWE), Venice (ITA), and Barnett (GBR) gathered in Rome. They agreed to launch the first FINA Swimming World Cup Series. Prize money was introduced, and the first meets were held in early 1989.

NOTABLY, THE "SWIMMING WORLD CUP" NAME HAD FIRST BEEN USED IN SEPTEMBER 1979 for a competition at Tokyo's Yoyogi Swimming Pool (50m). Eight teams competed: the United States, Canada, Sweden, the Soviet Union, and Japan, along with regional teams representing Oceania (Australia and New Zealand), Latin America, and the rest of Europe.

IN 1992, World Aquatics staged its first and only "Super Final" in Palma de Mallorca (ESP), open only to swimmers who had qualified through the series. The following year, the city hosted the inaugural World Swimming Championships (25m).

THROUGH THE EARLY 1990S, the series continued to expand. St. Petersburg (then Leningrad, RUS) hosted in 1991 and 1992 before withdrawing in 1993, when Beijing joined the calendar. Shanghai and Hong Kong were added in 1994. That same year, at the World Aquatics Technical Congress in Rome, leaders agreed to officially recognise World Records in the 50m backstroke, breaststroke, butterfly, and the 100m individual medley in the short-course pool.

THE LATE 1990S BROUGHT FURTHER GROWTH. The Swimming World Cup debuted in Sydney (AUS) and Rio de Janeiro (BRA) in 1998, with both nations continuing to host events in subsequent years. In 1999/2000, the ranking system was changed: final classification was replaced by scoring based on individual events. To make the series more competitive and engaging, World Aquatics introduced a new format beginning with the 2001/2002 season.

From then on, scoring was based on the World Aquatics Points Table, with only a swimmer's best result counting. The 2003/2004 edition broke new ground with stages in Africa (Durban) and Asia (Daejeon, KOR). Between 2007 and 2012, the calendar became more compact, concentrated into October and November, to attract stronger coverage and international attention.



HISTORY OF THE SERIES

Past & Present of the Swimming World Cup

IN 2013, the series began earlier in August, with most events in Asia (Beijing, Tokyo, Singapore) and additional meets in Doha and Dubai. In 2015, the Swimming World Cup was held in 50m pools for the first time, from Paris to Beijing to Doha, before returning exclusively to 25m pools for the 2016 and 2017 seasons.

THE SERIES RETURNED TO 50M POOLS IN 2019, aligning with preparations for the Tokyo 2020 Olympic Games. In 2021, Berlin hosted its 20th World Cup event—remarkably, the German capital had featured in every season since 1988, except 2018 and the cancelled 2020 edition.

IN 2022, the season began once again in Berlin, which also hosted a World Aquatics Diving World Cup. That year, Canada and the United States returned as World Cup hosts after absences of 21 and 16 years, respectively. The "Triple Crown" concept was also introduced: athletes who won the same event at every stop earned an additional USD 10,000 bonus and a symbolic golden crown.

THE 2023 SERIES RETURNED TO 50M POOLS, giving athletes valuable qualification opportunities ahead of the World Aquatics Championships – Doha 2024 and the Paris 2024 Olympic Games. In 2024, the Swimming World Cup visited three Asian cities across consecutive weeks, serving as a lead-in to the World Aquatics Swimming Championships (25m) in Budapest, where a record 30 short-course World Records were set.

IN 2025, the circuit returns to its North American roots with three stops: first-time hosts Carmel, Indiana and Westmont, Illinois, followed by Toronto, Canada. Building on the success of the Triple Crown, the bonus returns in 2025, alongside World Record-breaking incentives and a total prize purse of USD 1.2 million.





CARMEL

From community roots to the Swimming World Cup stage

Making its international aquatics hosting debut is Carmel, Indiana. This event marks the return of the World Cup to the United States, one of the original countries to host the inaugural season in 1988.

Carmel may be a first-time host, but the region is well-acquainted with elite aquatics events. It has previously hosted 11 significant World Aquatics events, including the Swimming World Cup 2022 final, the 2019 Champions Series, the 2017 World Junior Swimming Championships, and the 2004 World Swimming Championships (25m) at what was then known as Conseco Fieldhouse, home of the NBA's Indiana Pacers.

For over 50 years, Carmel has been a center of swimming excellence, fostering world-class athletes through a strong, community-driven program. Three members of Team USA for the Paris 2024 Games come from Carmel: Drew Kibler, along with siblings Aaron and Alex Shackell.

FIVE TOP ATTRACTIONS TO VISIT BETWEEN COMPETITIONS

MIDTOWN & CITY CENTER

Just south of Main Street and the Arts & Design District are two more shopping and dining destinations to explore. Walk down Monon Boulevard to find Midtown with restaurants, shops, and a community gathering areas. Grab a seat on the grassy lawn or swinging benches to watch sporting events and movies. City Center has even more dining, including can't miss, The Cake Bake Shop.

MONON TRAIL

The Monon Trail is a rails-to-trails paved path spanning through central Indiana, connecting south to downtown Indianapolis and north to Sheridan. This premier outdoor amenity is perfect for biking, walking and running. Explore the area, stop for a dish or get your steps in and enjoy the beauty of the outdoors. Along the path, discover must-see parks like Central Park, Monon Community Center, Midtown, City Center and the Arts & Design District.

ALLIED SOLUTIONS CENTER FOR THE PERFORMING ARTS

A three-venue, world-class performing arts center. At the Palladium, enjoy shows by top artists from around the world in genres including pop, rock, country, classical, jazz and comedy. Don't miss the Great American Songbook Foundation and its songbook archives and exhibit gallery on the Palladium's Gallery Level.

CARMEL ARTS & DESIGN DISTRICT

Located in the heart of downtown Carmel on Main Street is the Arts & Design District, home to designers, art galleries, showrooms and the Indiana Design Center, restaurants and a variety of boutique and specialty shops.

WESTMONT Midwest hospitality that welcomes the world

Making its debut as host for the World Aquatics Swimming World Cup is the Village of Westmont, located 20 miles west of downtown Chicago in prestigious DuPage County. Westmont is well known for being a former home of the late "Godfather of Chicago Blues" Muddy Waters and the current international headquarters of Ty, Inc., makers of the world-famous Beanie Babies. With the opening of FMC Natatorium at Ty Warner Park in 2020, Westmont quickly became a hub for major aquatic championships, with FMC Natatorium having hosted the TYR Pro Swim Series, USA Artistic Swimming U.S. Collegiate Championship, USA Water Polo Kap7 Champions Cup, USA Water Polo Olympic Development Program National Championship, and more. FMC Natatorium is widely considered among the best indoor aquatic facilities in the United States, offering a nine-lane competition pool, eight-lane training pool, four locker rooms, and onsite seating for 1,300. Not far from FMC, visitors can enjoy the popular and diverse restaurants throughout Westmont; explore the best of DuPage County; or take a quick train ride to downtown Chicago — the third largest city in the United States — renowned for its architecture, food, and diverse culture.

FIVE TOP ATTRACTIONS TO VISIT BETWEEN COMPETITIONS

SKYDECK CHICAGO

The highest observation deck in America awaits thrill seekers and sightseers at Skydeck Chicago on the 103rd floor of Willis Tower (formerly known as the Sears Tower.) For an unforgettable and heart stopping experience, step out onto The Ledge — an all-glass balcony suspended 1,353 feet above the bustling streets. Or simply marvel at the 360-degree views spanning up to four states. A visit is complete with The Chicago Museum at Skydeck, where guests are immersed in Chicago history and culture.

CHICAGO ARCHITECTURAL TOUR

Chicago is renowned for its rich architectural history, from its Greek Revival buildings that survived the Great Chicago Fire to the legendary architects that invented the skyscraper and shaped modern Chicago. Whether touring by bus, foot, or on the Chicago River, learn about the city's iconic skyline and the innovative styles that continue to influence architecture today. Considered a must-do while in Chicago, tours offer enthusiasts and those simply looking to experience the beauty of Chicago a memorable journey through one of America's most architecturally significant cities.

FALL COLOR FESTIVAL AT THE MORTON ARBORETUM


A trip to The Morton Arboretum offers a spectacular escape into nature, all within reach of Westmont. 1,700 acres of open spaces and quiet cathedrals of trees await, featuring 4,000 species of trees from 40 countries. Visitors can take a leisurely stroll, hop on the guided tram, traverse nine miles of paved road, or hike along 16 miles of trails. Every autumn, fiery reds, golden yellows, and deep oranges define the landscape during the Fall Color Festival. Visitors will also enjoy the Vivid Creatures art exhibition, featuring five animal sculptures ranging in size from eight to 24 feet tall, that illustrate the interconnected relationships between creatures and their ecosystems.

CANTIGNY

This former estate of Chicago Tribune publisher Colonel Robert R. McCormick invites visitors of all ages to spend the day immersed in a blend of history, nature, and recreation. History enthusiasts will appreciate the First Division Museum, which honors the 1st Infantry Division of the U.S. Army. Not to be missed is the Tank Park, where guests can explore the collection of tanks from World War I through Desert Shield and Desert Storm. Wander among the award-winning gardens, which offer every-changing beauty each season. Cantigny also offers a restaurant, picnic areas, and a playground.

OAKBROOK CENTER

Oakbrook Center is the largest, premier open-air shopping destination in the Midwest, offering a blend of luxury and convenience in a beautifully landscaped environment. With over 160 stores, including highend brands, it caters to diverse preferences. Enjoy a variety of dining options, from casual eateries to fine dining, along with several major attractions including Great Big Game Show, Pinstripes, Puttshack, and Wonderverse Chicago — the first of its kind created by Sony Pictures offering an immersive world of entertainment.

World Cup series returns to where it all began

For the final stop of the 2025 series, the World Aquatics Swimming World Cup returns to Toronto, a city that hosted the competition in 2022, as well as the first-ever edition of the event back in 1988. Canada's largest city is a world leader in business, finance, technology, entertainment and culture, and one of the most multicultural cities around the globe. In addition to the 2022 World Cup, the Toronto Pan Am Sports Centre's competition pool, with a seating capacity of 3,500, has played host to numerous major swimming meets over the past decade, including the 2015 Pan American and Parapan American Games, as well as the Canadian Olympic and Paralympic Trials in 2016, 2021 and 2024.

FIVE TOP ATTRACTIONS TO VISIT IN TORONTO BETWEEN THE COMPETITIONS

THE CN TOWER

Built between 1972 and 1976, the CN Tower was once the tallest building in the world, at 553 meters tall. One of Canada's greatest landmarks and one of the seven wonders of the modern world, the CN Tower has come to define the Toronto skyline and is the city's most famous tourist destination. The iconic observation and communications tower offers unparalleled panoramic views of the city and Lake Ontario, with the thrilling option of the EdgeWalk around the tower's exterior. The view from the top is simply breathtaking. The revolving 360 Restaurant at the top completes a full rotation every 72 minutes.

THE ROYAL ONTARIO MUSEUM

The Royal Ontario Museum is the biggest museum of world cultures and natural history in Canada. Located right in downtown Toronto, the striking main entrance to the museum, known as The Crystal, will draw you in right away. The museum is home to a range of exquisite cultural and historical pieces collected from all over the world. All three levels are rife with treasures organized into more than 20 galleries — like the new Willner Madge Gallery, Dawn of Life or the Sir Christopher Ondaatje South Asian Gallery or Life in Crisis: The Schad Gallery of Biodiversity.

ST. LAWRENCE MARKET

Right in the middle of Toronto's historic Old Town district sits one of the city's best foodie destinations: the St. Lawrence Market. The market has existed in some form since 1803, and though the complex has evolved, it still contains an authentic farmer's market -- the best in the world according to a 2012 National Geographic article -- complete with specialty foods and restaurants for every taste. Treat your senses, as you see, smell, and sample fresh produce and cheese in the same place vendors have been selling it for over two centuries.

THE DISTILLERY HISTORIC DISTRICT

Restaurants, boutiques, arts, and entertainment are The Distillery Historic District's claims to fame. This pedestrian-only village features more than 40 heritage buildings that now house everything a modern traveller might enjoy. New fashion can be found in restored, Victorian-era buildings; culinary inventions are hidden behind weathered red brick walls; and art galleries and performance venues host events year-round, ensuring that the old neighbourhood is full of life. The sector gets its name from the Gooderham & Worts whiskey distillery, which used to occupy many of the buildings.

HOCKEY HALL OF FAME

If the expression "when in Rome" were applied to Canada, it would probably have something to do with ice hockey. Whether you're already a fan, or have never seen a game before, you may want to pay a visit to the Hockey Hall of Fame to get up to speed with Canada's favourite sport. Ice hockey is often used to define Canada and it's here on display, with 65,000 square feet filled to the brim with artifacts, mementos, and relics straight from the rink. Learn about the members inducted into the Hall of Fame, and see the sticks, gloves, pucks, and even nets from some of the greatest games ever played. And, most important of all, touch the actual Stanley Cup.

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FIVE TOP INTERNATIONAL MALE SWIMMERS TO WATCH ON THE WORLD AQUATICS SWIMMING WORLD CUP 2025

NOÈ PONTI (SUI)



ACHIEVEMENTS

Swiss butterfly specialist Ponti aims to add to his notable career successes to date at the 2025 World Aquatics Swimming World Cup. He enjoyed a breakthrough season in 2021, winning bronze in the 100m butterfly at the Olympic Games in Tokyo and following it with a silver in the 200m butterfly at the World Aquatics Swimming Championships (25m) in Abu Dhabi.

Atthe following year's World Swimming Championships (25m) in Melbourne, Ponti collected two medals with a silver in the 50m butterfly and bronze in the 200m butterfly. He earned a maiden Swimming World Cup victory in the 100m butterfly at the last stop in Budapest in 2023. He followed it with a treble butterfly success across 50m, 100m and 200m at the European Short Course Championships in Otopeni.

After narrowly missing Olympic medals at the Paris 2024 Games, Ponti went on an absolute tear in the 25m pool, winning seven Swimming World Cup events in 2024. He then followed this up with three golds at the World Aquatics Swimming Championships (25m) – Budapest 2024 before taking two silvers in the 50m and 100m Butterfly at the World Aquatics Championships – Singapore 2025.

THOMAS CECCON (ITA)





ACHIEVEMENTS

Italy's Thomas Ceccon will be looking to continue his winning streak on the Swimming World Cup circuit in 2025, having won gold in the 100m backstroke at the Olympic Games Paris 2024, the same event in which he holds the world record.

Ceccon is known for his versatility, having already claimed multiple medals in the World Aquatics Swimming World Cup, including gold in the 100m freestyle in 2024. He has also been a key contributor to Italy's relay teams on the world stage, earning medals at the World Aquatics Championships, World Aquatics Swimming Championships (25m) and the Olympic Games, including the gold and world record in the men's 4x100m freestyle relay at the World Swimming Championships (25m) 2022 in Australia.

The 2025 Swimming World Cup presents a chance for him to further solidify his status as one of the world's swimming greats.

CHAD LE CLOS (RSA)





ACHIEVEMENTS

South Africa's most decorated Olympian of all time, with four medals, Chad Le Clos scored one of the sensations of the London 2012 Games, defeating the great Michael Phelps in the 200m butterfly. Four years later, he shared silver with the American great in a stunning 100m butterfly final in Rio.

As one of the most decorated swimmers in history, Le Clos is no stranger to success on the World Aquatics Swimming World Cup circuit. Over the course of his career, Le Clos has won over 150 World Cup medals, including multiple titles in the 100m and 200m butterfly. He was crowned the overall men's Swimming World Cup champion four times (2011, 2013, 2014, and 2017).

At Paris 2024, Le Clos competed in what was his fifth Olympic Games. Although he did not medal, his experience and competitive spirit continue to make him a fan favourite on the international circuit.

This year, the World Cup presents a chance for him to continue adding to his already historic medal collection, and he will no doubt continue to be seen as a dangerous competitor in his signature butterfly events.






FIVE TOP INTERNATIONAL MALE SWIMMERS TO WATCH ON THE WORLD AQUATICS SWIMMING WORLD CUP 2025

HUBERT KÓS (HUN)





ACHIEVEMENTS

A world junior record holder in the 200m individual medley and the Olympic and World champion in the 200m backstroke in both the 25m and 50m pools, Hubert Kos had been carrying Hungary's storied swimming legacy that stretches back to countryman Alfred Hajos winning the first modern Olympic swimming event at the Athens 1896 Games. For Kos, as a boy, the biggest rockstar in the sport was undoubtedly 13-time long-course world medallist Laszlo Cseh of Hungary.

Currently a student-athlete studying Human Dimensions of Organisations at the University of Texas, look for the 22-year-old to expand his winning repertoire beyond the backstroke events on the 2025 Swimming World Cup circuit.

He comes into this year's series on a roll, with a world short course title in the men's 200m backstroke,

gold in the same event in the 50m pool at the World Aquatics Championships – Singapore 2025 and a bronze in the men's 200m medley where his training mate Leon Marchand set the world record.

ADAM PEATY (GBR)





ACHIEVEMENTS

Widely considered the greatest men's breaststroke swimmer in history, Peaty's sporting accolades include three Olympic gold medals, eight World titles, and a string of World Records-setting performances in the 50m and 100m breaststroke events.

The Uttoxeter, Staffordshire, England native made his international debut at the 2015 World Aquatics Championships in Kazan, where he won gold in the 50m and 100m breaststroke events and broke the world record in the 100m breaststroke.

Peaty carried this success into the Rio 2016 Games, where he won gold in the men's 100m breaststroke, becoming the first British male Olympic swimming champion since 1988. He was utterly dominant thereafter, defending his World titles in 2017 and 2019, becoming the first person to ever swim under 57 seconds in the 100m breaststroke. At the Tokyo 2020 Olympics, he made history as the first British swimmer to successfully defend an Olympic title, securing gold in the 100m breaststroke and contributing to Team GB's victory in the 4x100m mixed medley.

A foot injury kept Peaty from the 2022 World Championships, but he came back to win two medals at the 2024 Worlds in Doha before securing two silvers at the Paris 2024 Olympic Games. Despite all these accolades, there is one thing missing in Peaty's career: a win on the Swimming World Cup. Could 2025 be the time the British lion adds this to his palmares?

From being a 14-year-old contender to becoming a champion and world record holder, Canadian swimmer Summer McIntosh's career is going stratospheric.

The Toronto-born Summer McIntosh was destined to be in the water. Her mother, Jill Horstead, competed in the 1984 Summer Games in swimming, so it really is no surprise that Summer found herself in the pool. At 14, McIntosh made her team for Canada at the Tokyo 2020 Olympics. As one of the youngest athletes at the Games, McIntosh placed fourth in the 400m freestyle. But Summer was just getting started. Her meteoric rise continued in 2022 at the World Aquatics Championships, where she won two world titles, along with a silver and a bronze.

The 2024 World Aquatics Female Swimmer of the Year, McIntosh, won three Olympic golds and a silver at the Paris 2024 Games, and three golds, a silver,

and a bronze in the short course pool at the World Aquatics Swimming Championships (25m) last December in Budapest, Hungary, The now 19-year-old is coming off one of the all-time great individual performances at the World Aquatics Championships, where she won four world titles and a bronze.

KATARZYNA WASICK (POL)

World medallist and powerhouse sprinter Katarzyna Wasick has captured attention in recent years with her impressive performances in freestyle events, particularly in the 50m and 100m events.

Wasick has represented Poland at an impressive five Summer Olympic Games (2008, 2012, 2016, 2020, 2024) and has consistently been a podium threat on the World Aquatics Swimming World Cup circuit, winning multiple silver and bronze medals in the 50m freestyle. Additionally, at the 2022 World Aquatics Championships in Budapest, she claimed three gold medals in the women's 50m and 100m freestyle events, as well as a silver medal in the 50m freestyle, becoming the second Polish female swimmer to win a long-course World Championship medal.

This year, she will be looking to add to her growing collection of World Cup honours, having just missed out on a medal at the Olympic Games in Paris in

2024 – though the Pole did finish last year by earning two bronze medals at the World Aquatics Swimming Championships (25m) in Budapest.

Australia's Mollie O'Callaghan comes into the 2025 Swimming World Cup as a five-time Olympic champion and 11-time world champion - with the 21-year-old Brisbane native matching Australia's all-time world title mark with fellow Aussie swimming icon lan Thorpe

O'Callaghan made her first international team at 15, when she competed for Australia at the World Junior Swimming Championships in Budapest, where she won silver as a member of the 4x100m freestyle relay team.

The 21-year-old freestyle ace has achieved notable success on both the World and Olympic stages. She won two Olympic gold medals at the Tokyo 2020 Games and three more gold medals at the Paris 2024 Games.

She has been just as prolific at the World Aquatics Championships, winning 11 golds and six silvers. Racing in the short-course 25m pool, O'Callaghan tasted considerable success when Australia hosted the World Aquatics Swimming Championships (25m), winning three relay golds. This year's Swimming World Cup will be O'Callaghan's first. Look for her to factor into every sprint and mid-distance freestyle event, as well as in the backstroke events.

Earlier this year in Singapore, Steenbergen backed up her individual 100m world title with a repeat performance, along with a bronze in the women's 4x100m freestyle relay.

Kylie Masse of LaSalle, Ont., has been one of Canada's top performers ever since she made her national team debut in 2015. The backstroke specialist has reached the podium at each of her three Olympic Games appearances, claiming two silver and three bronze medals, making her the first Canadian swimmer to win an individual medal at three successive Games. By capturing bronze in the 200m backstroke in Paris at 28 years, 197 days old, she also became the oldest Canadian woman to win an Olympic medal in swimming.

MARY-SOPHIE HARVEY (CAN)





ACHIEVEMENTS

A long-time national team member, Mary-Sophie Harvey has emerged as a versatile swimmer on the world stage in recent years. She turned heads at the 2023 Pan American Games in Santiago, Chile, where she tied the record of most podium finishes by a female Canadian swimmer at one Games with seven, including three triumphs.

Harvey added to her collection at the 2024 World Aquatics Swimming Championships (25m) in Budapest, claiming two silver and three bronze medals en route to being named World Aquatics Female Breakout Athlete of the Year. The first individual long course world championship medal of her career, bronze in the 200m individual medley, followed at the 2025 World Aquatics Championships in Singapore,

The two-time Olympian from Trois-Rivières, Que., led all Canadians during the 2024 World Aquatics Swimming World Cup series with eight medals, including three wins.

TAYLOR RUCK (CAN)





ACHIEVEMENTS

Taylor Ruck enjoyed international success early on in her career and has never looked back since. Making her Olympic debut at just 16 in 2016, she helped the Canadian women capture a pair of relay bronze medals, in the 4x100m and 4x200m freestyle. Five years later, in her second Games in Tokyo, she also contributed to two relay medals, this time in the 4x100 free (silver) and 4x100 medley (bronze).

In between those Games appearances, Ruck won a total of eight medals at the Gold Coast 2018 Commonwealth Games which tied Canada's Ralph Hutton (1966) and Australians Emily Seebohm (2010) and Susie O'Neill (1998) for the most medals by an athlete at a single edition.

Over her career, the 25-year-old has captured 16 senior world championships medals, including world titles at the 2016 FINA World Swimming Championships (25m) in Windsor, Ont., in the women's 4x50 and 4x200 freestyle relavs.

Wilm, a backstroke specialist who hails from Calgary and trains in Vancouver, has been Canada's most regular World Aquatics Swimming World Cup participant in recent years, competing in all nine series stops from 2022 to 2024. She has been as successful as she has been active, collecting 20 medals over that span.

The 27-year-old, who made her Olympic debut at Paris 2024, has also amassed her share of hardware at world championships over the years, capturing eight short course and six long course medals. Her best haul came at the 2024 World Aquatics Swimming Championships (25m) in Budapest, Hungary, where she reached the podium five times, including individual bronze in the 100m backstroke.


ACHIEVEMENTS

Sophie Angus is one of the Canadians set to compete in all three World Aquatics Swimming World Cup events in 2025, and is hoping to add more hardware after claiming bronze in the 100m breaststroke a year ago in Incheon, Korea.

The Paris 2024 Olympian has won long course and short course world championships bronze medals in recent years, including in the 4x100m mixed medley relay at Budapest 2024 (25m) and the women's 4x100 medley at Fukuoka 2023 (50m).

The 26-year-old also enjoyed success at the 2023 Pan American Games in Santiago, Chile, taking individual silver in the 100m breaststroke and gold in the 4x100 medley relay.
