It is my great pleasure to welcome you to the 2026 edition of the World Aquatics Diving World Cup. This year's series will be hosted across three cities with proud aquatic traditions, each offering a distinctive setting for the world's best divers to showcase their talent on the global stage.

Once again, the world's diving elite return to Montreal, Canada, to open the 2026 Diving World Cup from 26 February to 1 March. A renowned host of major sporting events – including the 1976 Olympics and 2005 World Aquatics Championships – Montreal has a rich diving history, having hosted 14 World Aquatics Diving World Cup and Grand Prix events, as well as the 2022 World Junior Diving Championships. The historic Montreal Olympic pool - a hub for both community and elite sport for over 50 years - will once again be the competition venue.

From Montreal, the Diving World Cup moves to Zapopan, Mexico, from 5–8 March 2026, marking the second consecutive year the city hosts the event. With Olympic diving medals in every Summer Games since 1932, Mexico has long been a cornerstone of the sport. The Centre Acuático Code Metropolitano – home to many of the country's top athletes – will provide a fitting backdrop for a memorable competition.

Following Zapopan, the Diving World Cup concludes in Beijing, China, with the Super Final from 1–3 May 2026. The iconic Water Cube, officially the National Aquatics Centre, will host the world's top divers. Steeped in Olympic history, including the 2008 Games, Beijing has also staged 11 World Aquatics Diving World Cups. With its passionate fans and strong commitment to elite aquatics, the city provides a fitting finale for the 2026 tour.

With the build-up to the 2027 World Aquatics Championships and the LA28 Olympic Games in sight – not to mention Beijing hosting the World Aquatics Championships in 2029- this year's Diving World Cup series serves as a vital stage in the athlete's journey towards one of the most action-packed and crucial periods in the sport's history.

I want to extend my sincere gratitude to our host cities, local organisers, volunteers, and everyone working behind the scenes to bring these events to life – your efforts are extremely valued and appreciated.

To all the divers, I wish you the very best. Enjoy the competition, take pride in it, and embrace this important moment in your career!

The World Aquatics Diving World Cup 2026, committed to delivering world-class events for athletes, fans, and stakeholders, builds on the success of the World Aquatics Championships – Singapore 2025 and the Paris 2024 Olympic Games. This year's tour revives the format introduced at last year's Super Final in Beijing, featuring head-to-head, semi-final, and final stages. Developed with input from elite divers, this format enhances broadcast appeal and maximises spectator excitement.

The World Aquatics Diving World Cup marks the start of an exhilarating journey leading to the World Aquatics Championships in Budapest 2027. Envision each event as a chapter in a grand narrative, unfolding in three iconic diving destinations.

The journey begins in Montreal, from February 26 to March 1, a city renowned for its diving legacy. The Centre Sportif du Parc Olympique, host to monumental events like the 1976 Olympics and the 2005 World Aquatics Championships, sets the stage for our opening chapter, capturing the spirit and history of diving in the region and beyond.

Next, from March 5 to 8, the Diving World Cup tour takes us to Zapopan, a destination rich in a robust diving tradition. This venue, under the esteemed leadership of national coach Iván Bautista, returns for another thrilling showcase. Here, spectators will witness the series' growing momentum and competitive spirit.

The year's series crescendos in Beijing, with the Super Final from May 1 to 3, at the storied Water Cube. This venue, famed for record-breaking feats during the 2008 Olympics and the 2025 Super Final, promises a spectacular climax. As we draw closer to our final destination in Budapest, Beijing encapsulates the zenith of athletic endeavour and fan engagement – a fitting prelude to the ultimate challenge in 2027.

Beijing, also set to host future events, will close the series amidst an electrifying atmosphere. Picture yourself in the packed Water Cube, the excitement palpable as the final dives determine the champions. This isn't merely a competition; it's an unforgettable adventure that sets the stage for Budapest 2027, where history and emotion intertwine to create moments that resonate long after an athlete ripped their entry into the water on their final dive with the Super Final title on the line.

# MONTREAL

## AND THE CENTRE SPORTIF DU PARC OLYMPIQUE



The 2026 World Aquatics Diving World Cup opens in Canada with a return to one of the sport's most storied destinations. Moving northeast from Canada's 2025 Diving World Cup host of Windsor, Montreal welcomes the world's best divers to launch the season in a city synonymous with international sport and aquatic excellence.

A proven host on the global stage, Montreal's legacy includes the 1976 Olympic Games and the 2005 World Aquatics Championships. Its connection to diving is equally distinguished, having staged 14 World Aquatics Diving World Cup, World Series, and Grand Prix events, as well as the World Junior Diving Championships in 2022. At the national level, Canada's commitment to the discipline is reflected in its history of hosting 41 World Aquatics diving competitions—underscoring the country's enduring role in the sport's global development.

Competition takes place at the Centre Sportif du Parc Olympique, the iconic venue built for the 1976 Olympic Games and now one of Canada's national high-performance diving centres. A cornerstone of Montreal's Olympic Park, the facility combines elite training infrastructure with a vibrant community presence, creating an atmosphere where history and high performance intersect.

The venue also holds recent competitive significance for the host nation. Quebec native Matt Cullen delivered a defining home moment at the 2022 World Junior Diving Championships, capturing gold in the Men's 10m Platform (16–18 category) before a passionate local crowd—an example of Montreal's passion for top sports events and diving, in particular.

With its deep-rooted sporting heritage, proven organisational expertise and an iconic Olympic venue, Montreal provides a fitting and formidable opening chapter to the 2026 World Aquatics Diving World Cup season.





# ZAPOPAN

AND THE CENTRE ACUATICO CODE METROPOLITANO



WORLD AQUATICS

The second stop of the Diving World Cup 2026 tour returns to Zapopan for the second consecutive year. Located within the Guadalajara Metropolitan Area, Zapopan and the Centro Acuático Code Metropolitano serves as Mexico's national diving training hub.

As a proven centre of excellence in aquatic sports, the venue has also hosted the 2013 Diving World Cup, the 2011 Pan American Games, and numerous national diving championships. With world-class coaching and a premier training facility, Mexico has built a rich tradition of excellence in diving. The nation has won diving medals at every Olympic Games since 1932.

At the Paris 2024 Olympic Games, Osmar Olvera and Juan Celaya claimed silver in the men's 3m synchronised springboard event, while Olvera also secured bronze in the individual 3m springboard. Olvera and Celaya followed up Paris 2024 with a career-defining year in 2025, one that started with his first World Cup win in the Men's 3m Synchronised in their home pool. Olvera followed this up with three silvers and gold in the Men's 3m Springboard individual at the 2025 World Aquatics Championships in Singapore.

Next to the aquatic centre, Parque Metropolitano de Guadalajara offers expansive green spaces, walking trails, and outdoor activities, making it a popular spot for relaxation. For those interested in culture, the nearby Santuario de Nuestra Señora de Zapopan is a historic basilica known for its stunning architecture and deep-rooted history.





# BEIJING

AND THE NATIONAL AQUATICS CENTRE  
(AKA THE “WATER CUBE”)

The Chinese capital of Beijing stands as a city of remarkable history and modern ambition, blending centuries-old cultural landmarks with cutting-edge urban development. Beijing is home to iconic sites such as the Forbidden City, the Temple of Heaven, and the Great Wall – all testaments to the city’s rich heritage. From these roots, Beijing has continuously evolved into a global hub for international sport and innovation.

As the first city to host both the Summer and Winter Olympic Games, Beijing has cemented its legacy in the world of sports. The 2008 Olympic Games were renowned for their scale and ambition. This is symbolised by the iconic National Aquatics Centre, affectionately known as the Water Cube, which served as the Olympic swimming, diving, and artistic swimming venue for the 2008 Games. Fourteen years later, the Water Cube again took centre stage as the curling venue of the Beijing 2022 Olympics. Today, this venerable venue beckons as the host of the 2026 Diving World Cup Super Final for the second consecutive year.

Chinese divers are coming off a transcendent run of success, sweeping all eight gold medals at the Paris 2024 Olympics and nine of the thirteen golds at the World Aquatics Championships – Singapore 2025, highlighted by leading divers such as Chen Yiwen, Wang Zongyuan and Chen Yiwen.







## INNOVATIVE NEW FORMAT FOR WORLD AQUATICS DIVING WORLD CUP – SUPER FINAL TO DELIVER MORE EXCITEMENT AND THRILLS

World Aquatics continues its commitment to innovation and elevating the sport's profile with a dynamic new format for individual events at the World Aquatics Diving World Cup – Super Final.

The 2026 Super Final, set for 1-3 May in Beijing, China, will feature an action-packed two-hour competition format, including a head-to-head stage, semi-final, and final for the second consecutive year, following its successful introduction at last year's Super Final in the Chinese capital.

The top 12 divers from the first two 2026 World Aquatics Diving World Cup stops will qualify for the Super Final, seeded based on their combined rankings from Stop 1 in Montreal, Canada (26 February – 1 March) and Stop 2 in Zapopan, Mexico (5-8 March).

### COMPETITION FORMAT

- **Head-to-Head Stage:** Divers are paired based on seeding, each selecting three dives. The lowest scorer in each pairing is eliminated, with six athletes advancing to the semi-final.
- **Semi-Final:** Points from the head-to-head stage carry over. Two groups of three divers compete, completing their full dive lists. The lowest scorer in each group is eliminated, leaving four divers for the final.
- **Final:** Previous scores reset. The four remaining divers perform their full lists, with the highest scorer claiming the World Aquatics Diving World Cup – Super Final title.

### STRATEGIC AND COMPETITIVE ENHANCEMENTS

This format emphasises strategy, requiring athletes to select their opening three dives based on both their strengths and their opponents' potential weaknesses.

- **Dive adjustments for the final must be submitted after the semi-final and no later than five minutes before the final begins.**
- **All dives must be completed to advance, even if an opponent withdraws.**
- **In the event of a tie at the head-to-head or semi-final stage, a dive-off will determine who progresses.**
- **The highest-scoring diver in each group who does not qualify will serve as a reserve for the next stage.**

These innovations were developed through extensive consultation with key stakeholders, including an athlete-representative focus group, ensuring a format that is both fair and thrilling for competitors and fans alike.

**CASSIEL ROUSSEAU  
(AUS)**

**ACHIEVEMENTS**


- **World Champion at Singapore 2025 and Fukuoka 2023**
- **Commonwealth Games gold medallist**
- **3-time Olympic finalist**

Relatively new to the sport of diving, Cassiel Rousseau quickly found his way in the sport. Cassiel hit the ground running when he switched from acrobatic gymnastics in 2017. A year later, Rousseau was crowned an Australian Elite Junior Champion. At the Tokyo 2020 Olympic Games, he made the Men's 10m Platform final.

In 2023, Rousseau became Australia's first-ever World Champion in the Men's 10m Platform, a feat that helped him be named World Aquatics Male Diver of the Year in 2023. At the Paris 2024 Olympics, Rousseau was just off the podium, finishing fourth in the Men's 10m Platform and sixth in the Men's Synchronised 10m Platform.

In 2025, Rousseau made a rousing and convincing run to the top of the Men's 10m Platform at the World Aquatics Championships in Singapore. Rousseau comes into 2026 as the reigning World Aquatics Male Diver of the Year award winner, his second time earning the honour.

Relativement nouveau dans le monde du plongeur, Cassiel Rousseau s'est très rapidement imposé dans la discipline. Il a connu des débuts fulgurants après sa transition depuis la gymnastique acrobatique en 2017. Un an plus tard, Rousseau était sacré champion junior d'élite australien. Aux Jeux Olympiques de Tokyo 2020, il s'est qualifié pour la finale du 10m plateforme messieurs.

En 2023, Rousseau est devenu le tout premier champion du monde australien au 10m plateforme messieurs, un exploit qui lui a valu le titre de Plongeur masculin de l'année World Aquatics 2023. Aux Jeux Olympiques de Paris 2024, il a échoué de peu au pied du podium, terminant quatrième du 10m plateforme messieurs et sixième du 10m plateforme synchronisé messieurs.

En 2025, Rousseau a réalisé un parcours impressionnant et sans équivoque vers le titre mondial du 10m plateforme messieurs lors des Championnats du monde World Aquatics à Singapour. Il aborde l'année 2026 en tant que Plongeur masculin de l'année World Aquatics en titre, remportant cette distinction pour la deuxième fois.

**ACHIEVEMENTS**


- **2-time Olympic individual champion**
- **9-time World Champion**
- **25-time World Cup winner**

Chen Yiwen is a defining figure in women's springboard diving. As a two-time Olympic and nine-time world champion, the Chinese star is central to China's renowned diving team, known for her technical precision, competitive consistency, and composure at the highest level.

Hailing from Haikou, Hainan, Chen came to diving later than many of her peers, after a career as a child actress, first encountering the sport in 2008 during a family visit to Guangdong. With no prior swimming experience, she was quickly recognised for her exceptional coordination, flexibility, and determination—qualities shaped by an energetic childhood that included dance and even early work as a child actress in Chinese television dramas.

Chen joined the Chinese national team in 2016 and won her first world title in 2018. Her career highlights include Olympic gold medals in both the women's 3m springboard and synchronised 3m springboard at Paris 2024 and three golds at the 2025 World Championships in Singapore, cementing her dominance.

Chen Yiwen est une figure emblématique du plongeur féminin au tremplin. Double championne olympique et neuf fois championne du monde, la star chinoise occupe une place centrale au sein de la célèbre équipe chinoise de plongeur, reconnue pour sa précision technique, sa régularité en compétition et son sang-froid au plus haut niveau.

Originaire de Haikou, dans la province du Hainan, Chen est arrivée au plongeur plus tard que beaucoup de ses pairs, après une première carrière comme actrice enfant. Elle a découvert ce sport en 2008, lors d'une visite familiale dans le Guangdong. Sans expérience préalable en natation, elle a rapidement été remarquée pour sa coordination exceptionnelle, sa souplesse et sa détermination – des qualités forgées par une enfance dynamique, marquée par la danse et même des rôles précoces dans des séries télévisées chinoises.

Chen a intégré l'équipe nationale chinoise en 2016 et remporté son premier titre mondial en 2018. Parmi les moments forts de sa carrière figurent les médailles d'or olympiques au tremplin 3m individuel et synchronisé dames aux Jeux Olympiques de Paris 2024, ainsi que trois titres mondiaux aux Championnats du monde World Aquatics 2025 à Singapour, confirmant sa domination.

(GBR)**

**ACHIEVEMENTS**

- **Great Britain's first-ever Olympic gold medal in diving (Men 3m Synchronised, Rio 2016 Games) and 4-time Olympic medallist**
- **8-time World Aquatics Championship medallist and 7-time Commonwealth Games champion**
- **5-time European Champion**

Jack Laugher made history at Rio 2016, becoming Great Britain's first Olympic diving champion with 3m Synchro partner Chris Mears. He then took silver in the Men's 3m Springboard at Rio, followed by 3m Springboard bronze in Tokyo 2020 and another bronze in the Men's 3m Synchro at Paris 2024. In 2025, Laugher earned bronze in the Men's 3m Synchro at Worlds and silver at the Diving World Cup Super Final with Anthony Harding.

Laugher's ongoing success includes nine World Championships medals, nine Diving World Cup wins, five European titles, and seven Commonwealth Games victories. The City of Leeds diver has consistently demonstrated his class throughout his career.

Jack Laugher est entré dans l'histoire à Rio 2016 en devenant le premier champion olympique britannique en plongeon, aux côtés de son partenaire Chris Mears en 3m synchronisé. Il a ensuite remporté l'argent au tremplin 3m messieurs à Rio, puis le bronze au tremplin 3m à Tokyo 2020, avant d'ajouter une nouvelle médaille de bronze en 3m synchronisé messieurs aux Jeux Olympiques de Paris 2024. En 2025, Laugher a décroché le bronze en 3m synchronisé messieurs aux Championnats du monde, ainsi que l'argent à la Super Finale de la Coupe du monde de plongeon avec Anthony Harding.

Le palmarès impressionnant de Laugher comprend également neuf médailles aux Championnats du monde, neuf victoires en Coupe du monde de plongeon, cinq titres européens et sept titres aux Jeux du Commonwealth. Le plongeur originaire de Leeds a constamment démontré son immense talent tout au long de sa carrière.

Timo Barthel might be afraid of heights, but that hasn't prevented him from being one of Europe's leading divers – and not only from the 3m springboard. The 28-year-old achieved his most significant international success at the Budapest 2022 and Fukuoka 2023 Worlds, where he earned bronze in the Men's 3m Synchro and Mixed 3m & 10m Team event, respectively.

Barthel says his focus is on the upcoming World Aquatics Championships in Singapore and the Los Angeles 2028 Olympics. Following the Paris 2024 Games, the Wurselen, Germany native spent some of his free time away from the sport in the City of Angels.

Timo Barthel a peut-être le vertige, mais cela ne l'a pas empêché de devenir l'un des meilleurs plongeurs européens – et pas uniquement au tremplin de 3 m. Âgé de 28 ans, il a connu ses plus grands succès internationaux aux Championnats du monde de Budapest 2022 et de Fukuoka 2023, où il a remporté le bronze en 3m synchronisé messieurs et lors de l'épreuve par équipes mixtes 3m & 10m.

Après les Jeux de Paris 2024, le natif de Wurselen, en Allemagne, a consacré une partie de son temps libre à s'éloigner du sport... dans la Cité des Anges.

**OSMAR OLVERA IBARRA  
(MEX)**

**ACHIEVEMENTS**

- **2-time World Champion and 8-time World medallist**
- **2-time Olympic medallist**
- **9-time medallist in the Diving World Cup**

Ibarra was the youngest diver on Mexico's team at Tokyo 2020, and at Paris 2024, he won silver in synchronised 3m springboard and bronze in individual 3m springboard. His Paris 2024 performance placed him among Mexico's diving elite. At the 2025 World Aquatics Championships in Singapore, Ibarra earned three silvers (Mixed 3m & 10m Team, Men's 1m Springboard, Men's 3m Synchronised) and won gold in the Men's 3m Springboard.

Ibarra is only the second athlete in his country's history to win two diving medals at the same Olympic Games. Since the 1932 Olympics in Los Angeles, Mexican divers have taken at least one medal at each edition of the Games.

Sa performance aux Jeux de Paris 2024 l'a placé parmi l'élite du plongeon mexicain. Aux Championnats du monde World Aquatics 2025 à Singapour, Ibarra a décroché trois médailles d'argent (épreuve par équipes mixtes 3m & 10m, tremplin 1m messieurs, tremplin 3m synchronisé messieurs) et a remporté l'or au tremplin 3m messieurs.

Ibarra est seulement le deuxième athlète de l'histoire de son pays à remporter deux médailles de plongeon lors d'une même édition des Jeux Olympiques. Depuis les Jeux Olympiques de Los Angeles 1932, les plongeurs mexicains ont remporté au moins une médaille à chaque édition des Jeux.

**WANG ZONGYUAN  
(CHN)**

Wang Zongyuan is a standout in men's springboard, with two Olympic and nine world titles. He's been crucial to China's dominance in 3m springboard events. Born in Xiangyang, Hubei Province, Wang's early connection to water began along the Han River. Starting out in gymnastics, he quickly advanced through China's diving system.

At the 2025 World Aquatics Championships in Singapore, Wang won gold in men's 3m synchronised springboard and bronze in the individual 3m springboard, extending his major international competition successes. He remains a central figure in China's elite diving team and a leading contender for the 2026 World Aquatics Diving World Cup.

Despite training abroad due to the war in Ukraine, Sereda consistently delivers high-level performances, underscoring his technical quality and resilience under pressure.

Accompanying her mother to their local pool, Katelyn Fung is part of Canada's new generation of tower divers, steadily establishing herself on the international stage. Specialising in the women's 10m and synchronised events, Fung has represented Canada at World Aquatics Championships, Diving World Cup stops, Junior World Championships and Junior Panam Games. At the most recent World Championships in Singapore, she finished 4th in the women's 10m event, a highly competitive field.

A medalist at the Junior World Diving Championships early in her career, Fung successfully transitioned into the senior ranks, earning finals appearances at major World Aquatics competitions. At the 2022 Junior World Championships in Montreal, she secured a medal in the women's 3m synchronised springboard.

Known for her technical consistency and composed competitive presence, Fung continues to be a key contributor to Canada's tower programme.

Born in La Paz but now calling Guadalajara, Mexico home, look for Gabriela Agundez to have significant hometown support during the opening Diving World Cup of the season in Guadalajara. A platform and synchro 10m diver, Agundez first made her mark on the international stage at the 2018 Youth Olympic Games, winning bronze in the Women's 10m Platform.

A Pan American Games champion, Agundez won bronze at the Tokyo 2020 Games and is a two-time silver medallist at the World Aquatics Championships. Agundez, a medallist on the 2024 Diving World Cup circuit, will be looking to secure her first World Cup victory this year.

Anisley Garcia Navarro's journey in diving began almost as soon as she could walk, following her older sisters onto the pool deck in Havana. Nicknamed "Tuti" by her first coach at age four, she quickly emerged as one of Cuba's most promising young talents and set her sights early on representing her country at the Olympic Games.

That ambition became reality at Paris 2024, where Garcia Navarro made history as the first Cuban diver to reach the semifinals in both the women's 3m springboard and 10m platform at a single Olympic Games. The milestone marked another step in a steady international rise that has seen her compete at multiple World Aquatics Championships since her senior debut in 2019.

A gold medallist on the World Aquatics Diving Grand Prix circuit and a top-10 finisher at the World Aquatics Championships, Garcia Navarro is now a World Aquatics Scholarship athlete, training in Toronto under four-time Olympian José Guerra.

## RULES FOR PHOTOGRAPHERS

- Photo positions shall be available at each venue and marked with a PHOTO sign.
- Photographers must be in position before the start of the competitions, depending on the venue. Photographers should remain in position during competitions and may only move during breaks.
- Photographers are not allowed to use tripods, ladders, or flashes while working (during the competitions). The flash may be used only at the victory ceremonies.
- Training sessions are not open to the photographers. Exceptions may occur, so please consult the event's Venue Manager.
- Taking videos with any device is strictly prohibited.
- Devices generating their own Wi-Fi (Wi-Fi hotspots) networks are strictly prohibited. They will be deactivated if they are used.
- All remote-control cameras must be approved by World Aquatics 24 hours in advance.
- Special care must be taken with photographic equipment for the safety of the athletes.
- Mobile phones should be set to silent/ vibration mode whenever in the field of play area. Recording Videos of the competition using your mobile phone is also strictly prohibited.
- In any photo position a strict 'NO BAG' policy applies. Bags will be removed. The constant breaching of this rule shall result in revoking the accreditation.
- Positions on the photo stands cannot be reserved (apart from the assigned agencies for operating the underwater cameras). Photo equipment left on the photo stands will be removed at the end of each session.
- Underwater cameras and the use of the catwalk are reserved for pool photographers and are subject to approval by World Aquatics.
- Some photo positions (including the underwater windows) will be available only with pre-booking on a first-come, first-served basis. If available, booking is made through the venue photo manager. An escort for those positions will always be in effect.
- Photographers are not allowed to be in a Mixed Zone where shooting is prohibited.
- In all accredited areas a strict NO SMOKING policy applies.
- Photographers should wear proper clothing at all times.
- Any breach of the regulations listed above could amount in the immediate withdrawal of accreditation.

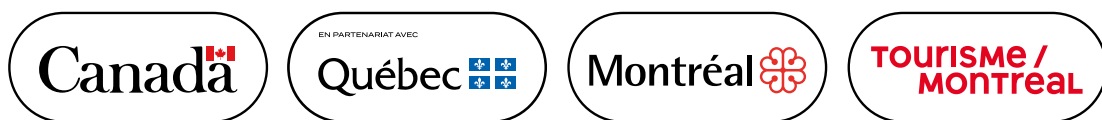

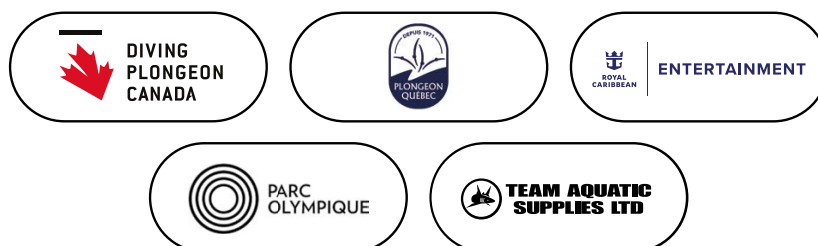
